Parish Council

Chairman's Annual Report

August—September 2018

Two years ago there was a collective sigh of relief from the people of Somersham when they realized that they were reading the last report from me. How things have changed! In May we had an election for members of the Parish Council and out of an electorate of just under 3,000 yet only 8, (yes eight), bothered to stand and that included one new

person. This means that there will be severe consequences for our village immediately and in the future. We have lost some of our powers already and in 2020 we will lose our Gold Standard and that is a shame as we were the first Parish, in East Anglia, to achieve this. Also our voice on matters that concern the village, such as planning matters, will not be listened to as much because other people will feel that as the Parish Council is only 8 people out of a possible 15 it cannot properly represent the whole village. Another danger is that we may not be able to discuss important matters as with so few members we might not be quorate at a meeting. I urge everybody to think about becoming a member and do something to help Somersham rather than, as some do, just criticize anonymously on social media.

An example of what happens when we work together is the Carnival.

I know that the Carnival Committee cannot take credit for the weather but they can take credit for organising a wonderful event that everybody enjoyed. Think what it would be like if nobody had bothered to help or organize the event.

Also we had the successful flower festival in the church which only happened because of the hard work of volunteers. When you read this we would have already had The Handlebards again at The Millennium Pavilion performing, this time, Romeo And Juliet and if last year is any guide it would have been a great night out and wonderful entertainment.

Our next event when you read this is Picnic in the Park at the Millennium in August which is promising to be bigger than before.

Before I finish it would be remiss of me not to mention that Lucy Bird, our Time Bank Co-ordinator, is leaving us for pastures new and she goes with our heartfelt thanks for all the work that she has done.

Mind you as one door closes another opens and I am pleased to welcome Katie Ixer as our new Co-ordinator. I know everybody will give her a warm welcome and I am not just talking about the Coffee Mornings.

In conclusion please think about what you can do for Somersham and for those with good memories I can report that Eva, Roman, Holly, Poppy, Jessie and Lucy are still behaving themselves.



Main Duties and Responsibilities

- To participate constructively in the government of the Parish Council
- To participate fully in the formation and scrutiny of the Parish Council's policies, budgets, strategies and service delivery including the 'Parish Plan'.
- To ensure, with other councillors, that the Parish Council is properly managed.
- To keep up to date with significant developments affecting the Parish Council at local, regional and national levels.
- To promote the economic, social and environmental well-being of the Parish taking account of the strategic effects on other communities and the Parish Council as a whole.
- To represent the whole electorate; listen, and then represent the views of the whole community when discussing council business and working with outside bodies
- To take an active part in the Parish Council's arrangements to build community capacity and promote measures that contribute to the Parish Council's Vision.
- To attend Parish Council meetings.
- To prepare for meetings and being properly informed about the issues to be discussed.
- To take part in meetings and form sound judgements based on what is best for the community and then abide by majority decisions.
- To represent the Parish Council on outside bodies to which the Councillor is appointed including the Standards Committee and Governing Bodies.
- To maintain proper standards of behaviour as an elected representative of the people.
- To fulfil the statutory and locally determined requirements of an elected member of a Local Authority and the Parish Council, including compliance with all relevant codes of conduct and maintaining high ethical standards, (including not disclosing confidential information and not using council resources for political purposes or for any other reason unless agreed by the Council)
- To participate effectively as a member of any committee or working party to which the Councillor is appointed.
- To contribute constructively to open government and democratic renewal to actively
 encourage to the Parish to participate generally in the government of the area and provide
 access to information where appropriate.

John Graham Memorial Plaque

Many residents will have known John Graham who lived in Somersham and died aged 92 in November 2013. He was a much loved and greatly missed guide, mentor and friend to many of us. As well as taking services and helping with others in the Somersham Benefice Churches, and also singing in the choir, he spent much of his time and energy in compiling crosswords for The Guardian, the Financial Times and for the magazine "1 Across" which he founded in 1984. He also devised 'bespoke' crosswords for individuals who wanted to celebrate a special event or anniversary.

Somersham Church has been given permission to install a simple memorial plaque on the wall of the south aisle. The plaque has been paid for by contributions from John's family and his many admirers. It will be dedicated by the Bishop of Huntingdon in a service on Wednesday 29th August at 2.30 pm. All are welcome to attend this special service. language Interpreter for over 7 hours even though he had a serious lung condition. Thanks to Jason and other people who shared their experience, we are challenging the local NHS to do better for disabled people.

No matter how big or small the issue, tell us about it. If it matters to you then it's very likely it matters to someone else. It is being said in the village, so we are told, that the church has closed, and we write to tell you that we are still "on the High Street" and looking forward to seeing you at our regular Sunday Service commencing at 10.30 every week.

The resignation of our Pastor last year meant that we had important decisions to make and these took time as we tried to follow in the path we felt our Lord was leading us. So the usual bi-monthly newsletter did not appear in this Village publication and some activities were stopped.

We are a youngish group and most of us have jobs to do and families to support so our time is limited.

We see the role of our church is the advancement of the Christian faith in the village by providing various community services.

For example, each Wednesday morning from 09.15 until 11.15 there is a Group (Little Sparrows) for young Mums and their toddlers where they can relax together and at the same time learn about Jesus Christ and his love of children through games, stories and music.

We also run a Club called "Explorers" for school children from Reception age to Year 6 and another called "Dynamite" for children at Year 7 to 13 level.

On Sunday mornings we provide a Creche so that Mums and Dads can sit and relax and enjoy the service without having to worry about their children.

Several of our Members also enjoy Badminton in St Ives every Monday evening for a couple of hours.

From time to time we run courses for people wanting to know more Christianity and twice a year a course on how to manage money.

The church premises are also available for hire on a regular or ad hoc basis.

So we hope to see you soon and there will be a regular update via this Magazine so that you can see what is happening in the life of Somersham Baptist Church.





CAMBRIDGESHIRE FIRE AND RESCUE SERVICE

As the weather brightens up and the sunshine starts brightening our weeks we welcome the longer, brighter nights and the opportunity to enjoy summer days and nights in the garden. When powering up your BBQ's and putting out the garden furniture for the summer season, be sure to take note of our top tips below to ensure you have a fun and safe summer in the garden.

- If cooking outdoors, always check BBQs over after winter storage. Keep them on level ground and ensure they are sited away from sheds, fences, overhanging foliage and property
- Keep children and garden games well away from the cooking area and never leave the barbecue unattended
- If you have a bonfire, build it well away from buildings, tents or other flammable objects and make sure it is properly out when you leave
- When out in the countryside, extinguish cigarettes properly and dispose of them responsibly never throw a lit cigarette into a field or wooded area
- Don't forget to stay safe around our county's waterways and if you see someone in trouble in water, call 999 immediately with clear details of your location
- When out camping or using a tent, never use candles inside or nearby and always discourage smoking nearby. Never cook inside a tent.
