The Parish Council meet every 4 weeks for full council meetings, all full council meetings are open to the public and are advertised around the village on noticeboards as well as the council's website www.somersham-pc.gov.uk. Councillors also attend as representatives on committees across the county and parish working groups relevant to the work of the council. Your Parish Councillors carry out all this work on behalf of you, our residents, for no monetary benefit, they do not even claim expenses.

The Parish Council employs 14 local people. In common with all employers the council has a duty to comply with matters relating to tax and national insurance plus the new legal requirement to offer workplace pensions, all this comes at a cost so we can offer and maintain community services and benefits.

What can a Timebank give you?

People join Timebanks for lots of different reasons. Some people join for social reasons and to meet new people, some people join as they want to help others and give back to their community and some people join just to join in!



Timebanking is so flexible that we welcome anyone who wants to get involved in the community, no matter how much or how little. A weekly newsletter is sent out to our members with any requests or offers from members in the Timebank. All the upcoming Timebank events are also listed in the Newsletter. We regularly hold the following events -

- Coffee morning on the 3rd Thursday of the month (10.30 am at the Millennium Pavilion)
- Two walks a month (1st and 3rd Tuesdays, meeting at the Nature Reserve gates on Station approach 10am)
- A weekly knitting group in Somersham (Tuesdays at 7pm, Centurian club) and a fortnightly knitting group in Pidley (Thursdays at 7pm at Pidley Village Hall)

Everyone is welcome to attend these events and Timebank members all receive Time credits for attending any of these groups too!

So what do people use any time credits earnt on?

There are lots of spending of time credits. Recently some organisational members used credits to attend a funding workshop and rented a meeting space. Lots of lifts have been requested and given to members and cooking help given to a member after an operation. Gardening help is also another popular exchange.

Time credits earnt with the Timebank can also be exchanged for Cambridgeshire Time credit vouchers which can be spent at a variety of locations. Members can exchange 10 time credits a month for 10 time credit vouchers. This link details all the spend opportunities available all over the country! - www.timecredits.com. SOMERSHAM BAPTIST CHURCH OFFERS TO GIVE YOUR FINANCES A NEW YEAR MAKEOVER

Our Church will again be running the popular CAP Money Course which teaches a simple cash-based system that helps people know **how to build a household budget** in a matter of weeks.

Maureen Davies (CAP Money Coach for Somersham Baptist Church): "Many of us will have used credit cards or dipped into the overdraft to pay for Christmas. Our message is: please don't struggle

on! Now really is the best time to put things in order and we can help to get your head in gear and take the practical steps to sort things out. When you know what you have in your account, and you know where it's going, you can plan for any big expenses like car repairs and the stress is taken away."

A Small team from Somersham Baptist Church gained training from UK charity Christians Against Poverty to put on the courses that now see more than 10,000 people gain money management skills each year.

One person who went on the course said: "I heard about the CAP Money Course from a friend. I wanted to pay off my credit card and stay out of my overdraft. It changed my life! I never thought it could be so easy, but the CAP Money system is so simple."

Maureen says: "Around three quarters of the people who turn to Christians Against Poverty for debt help across the UK say they had problem debt, partly because they didn't have any tuition in budgeting and money management. We would rather people in our area have the skills to avoid serious debt problems and the best thing about the CAP Money system is that it's flexible, so as your income or outgoings change, it can help you stay on top."

The next course starts at 7.15pm on February 13th 2019 at Somersham Baptist Church, High Street, Somersham, PE28 3JB (opposite Tesco's).

HOW YOU HAVE HELPED TO MAINTAIN & IMPROVE OUR PARISH CHURCH

The Parish Church is cherished by many people in Somersham. Since 2008 when the pews at the back were removed to create a social space a great deal about the church has changed.

In 2013 the 'Vestry Project' took place in which an oak/glazed screen was erected at the base of the tower. A toilet with disabled access was provided and refreshment facilities with hot and cold running water were established. Solid oak doors were installed at the South porch entrance along with glazed internal doors.

In 2016 a new lighting scheme in the interior of the church was installed and masonry repairs to the outside of the building were carried out.

In 2017 the roof of the chancel was completely re-slated.

Last year a new heating system was installed. In addition to these major improvements a number of smaller projects have been carried out.

All of these things have cost vast amounts of money which the Parochial Church Council have to find as they have no source of income other than church collections and fundraising events. Much of the money has been secured in grants from various trusts and some has come from individual bequests and legacies.

The church is open daily from 9 am until 4 pm why not pay it a visit if you haven't been in for a long time?

In 2010 a new organisation "Friends of Somersham Parish Church" was formed. It is an independent body working alongside the PCC to finance specific projects and routine maintenance through fundraising activities. The *Friends* are a group of people who have an interest in this historic building and the churchyard, but who may not necessarily wish to be part of the congregation or worship at the church.

There are about 70 members of the Friends and about 50 people who take part in its 100 Club Lottery. Anyone can join the 'Friends' for only £5 per annum – pick up a membership form from our stand just inside the church porch, fill it in and return it to the address on the form.

Many of you will have helped fund this important work by attending concerts that have been held in the church or bought produce from the monthly stalls that we hold at the Cross.

A Warm Welcome at St John's Church

Last year we reported that a new heating system was being installed in the Parish Church. Work started at the end of April and was not completed until the end of September. The new system is made up of tall radiators at both ends of the church and a number of fan convectors situated in various places around the building. Those attending the regular church services are now benefitting from the improved heating, as are those who come to the regular activities that take place in the church. The Rev Sue is delighted with the new heating which is much better, especially for the older members of the congregation. Jess O'Reilly who organises the weekly 'Little Acorns' toddler and parent group says that it so much more comfortable, particularly for the little ones. People who come along to the concerts, exhibitions and other events in the church are also expressing their pleasure at this important improvement.

The cost of the entire heating project was almost £70,000 (£66,050). It was paid for by using part of a very generous legacy that the church received several years ago from a local resident, a large donation from an individual and the rest was made up of grants from a number of different organisations – The Friends of the Church, The Rigby Trust and the largest amount, £25,000 coming from WREN's FCC Community Action Fund. WREN is a not-for-profit business that awards grants for the community, conservation and heritage projects from funds donated by FCC Environment through the landfill Communities Fund. FCC Environment is one of the UK's leading waste and resource management companies. Their approach is to minimise the amount of waste that ends up in landfill by transforming it into valuable resources wherever possible.

Subject: Bus Timetable

Dear Sirs,

It would be very useful if you could have a bus timetable in your magazine.

Dear J. Thank you for your e-mail and very useful suggestion, and you should note that we have published some bus timetables in the past. However, we only print the Newsletter 6 times per year and bus schedules have regularly changed outside of our printing cycle in the past; we can therefore never be relied upon to be timely and accurate. The upshot is that customers would always have to check with the bus company before any journey to confirm departure times in order to ensure they can still make appointments or follow-on travel arrangements etc.

We usually suggest that if someone wants to use local buses, it is advisable to collect a timetable from the library (the company timetables are usually replaced there when schedules change) but then to ring up the bus company before traveling to ensure they get the most accurate departure times. You might also be aware that a major franchise study is about to complete which will likely alter the service delivery in Somersham yet again.

I'm sorry we couldn't be more helpful but thank you again for your correspondence.

Police and Crime Commissioner's Winter Newsletter

The Police and Crime Commissioner for Cambridgeshire and Peterborough, Jason Ablewhite, has just published his Winter Newsletter. The actual document (6 pages) will be available at selected libraries throughout the county but can also be downloaded from the internet via this link:

This edition focuses on what is being done to support victims and witnesses of crime in our region. Additionally, you can find out how you could become a volunteer to help victims of crime recover from their experience. There's also information about the Victim Services website: an online, one-stop-shop of available support for the victims and witnesses of crime to help them cope and recover.

Meanwhile, last month, we heard that Cambridgeshire has been chosen as one of only five areas in the country to receive direct government funding for support services for sexual violence. The significance of this is that it can now decide locally how best to support those affected by these traumatic crimes.
