I am glad to report that we have now increased the number of councillors to ten – to be able to hold a meeting and get business done we require a minimum of 5 councillors present. So, if you want to see what goes on and have a say in what might go on, please contact the Executive Officer at the parish office...another five wanted !

Farmers Market update – after taking legal advice it is not possible to hold a market within 7 miles of an existing one. Somersham is within this mileage limit to St Ives, so a farmers' market cannot take place in Somersham (even though we have a charter from King John.)

The repair café at the Millennium Pavilion should be open by the time you read this. The café is designed to support men's mental health, so please pop on down and see what it's all about.

I was privileged to be invited to a "Mission Ready" event at Bassingbourn barracks recently. We were treated to some displays, including modern first aid in the field, mine detecting, a virtual range and what it like to be trapped in an overturned vehicle. It was very interesting to see the developments in weapons and army life in general. Anyone who has served would not recognise the way things are done now, or the dress and appearance of those doing those things. A real eye opener! It appears the modern forces want to rely a lot on reserves and are promoting the idea to employers.

The Neighbourhood Plan is continuing to evolve and there will be a stall at the Carnival – so please do stop by and say what you think.

There are a lot of changes going to take place in the next 2/3 years regarding the county and district councils and the way in which they are run. As more definite details become available, we will let you know. Who remembers the sort out in 1972?

There will be elections held on 1st May and by the time you read this these will be over and done, with new people in the 'hot seats'.

Also, huge congratulations go to our Executive Officer Irene Healiss for successfully passing the Community Governance at Level 4. We wish her all the best as she carries on to Level 5.

Council Tax for Somersham

There have been several comments on social media recently about the level of council tax in Somersham compared to other towns and villages. This has also led to some ill-informed comments and speculation. Hopefully you will find the following information useful.

Parish Councillors are elected by parish residents every four years to take decisions on behalf of the community. They receive no remuneration. The role is entirely voluntary. All meetings are held, and decisions taken in public every four weeks with agendas published beforehand. Each meeting includes a public forum where all are welcome. Meeting minutes and accounts are all published on the council website.

The parish precept, or Council Tax demand, is a simple calculation. It is the number and cost of facilities divided by the number of taxable properties.

In response to local expectations the council has over the last 25 years been proactive and ambitious, seeking to provide as much as possible for local residents. As a result, Somersham has far more to offer than any other village in this part of the county. This includes the Millennium Sports Facility, Norwood Recreation Field, Play Area, Multi-Purpose Sports Area, Squash Court, Car Park, Library, Lake, Nature Reserve as well as the Timebank and Changing Lives activities, plus a full time grounds/handyman. Highway improvements have also been introduced in response to residents' complaints about speeding traffic. These are all provided or assisted by your parish council and managed by staff and an office.

As the village grows over the next few years, the number of tax contributing households will increase, without the need for any significant increase in facilities. This means that council tax should not need to rise as it has in the past.

Comparison has been made with St Ives which charges only slightly more Council Tax than Somersham. St Ives Town has four times the number of properties, but their council does not provide four times the benefits. Market Towns are different in that they are seen as strategic settlements expected to cater for a much wider geographical area than the town. Consequently, the Sports and Leisure facilities, Library, Car Parks etc are provided by the County and District Councils, not the Town Council. Market towns also qualify for grants from the Combined Authority.

As local residents, you may be aware that East Hunts Care Ride has now ceased operation. Huntingdonshire Volunteer Centre (HVC) were recently approached to continue providing the much needed Community Car Scheme in your area, and HVC were anxious not to leave vulnerable and elderly residents without transport. We are delighted to report that HVC have agreed to take over the running of the scheme, continuing the provision of a Community Car Scheme for Somersham, Bluntisham, Earith and Colne.

This service is for anyone who needs to make essential journeys eg. for medical appointments shopping and social meetings, where no suitable public transport exists.

The journeys are made possible by volunteers who use their own cars to provide transport. It is helpful for us to know at the time of booking if a wheelchair, walker or an assistance dog needs to be transported and if you require any assistance getting in and out of the car. We would also appreciate as much notice as possible, ideally 7 days although we understand this is not always possible.

There is a charge of 45 pence per mile for the journey, based upon mileage travelled by the driver plus a booking fee of $\pounds 2$ per journey to cover running costs. This is made payable to the driver at the end of the journey. A minimum fee of $\pounds 2$ will apply for short journeys of 5 miles or less plus the $\pounds 2$ booking fee.

Our St Ives office is open from 12:30 to 15:00 Monday to Thursday - 01480 301462 - to book your journey you can call during office hours or leave us a message on the answer phone and someone will get back to you as soon as possible.

4. Bowls clubs are sociable places full of people looking to have fun, so bowls is a great way to relax, make new friends and feel part of your local community.



WELCOME TO OUR NEW FEATURE - READERS LETTERS



You may have noticed the building site at Montana in Pidley Road where Michael Murray has his sign workshop. After the demolition and clearance of the original structure it has been a long wait for the construction phase of a new house to begin. The new house is special for a number of reasons the most significant of which is that the walls are made using earth blocks with no cement.

Why am I Malcolm Carrington writing this for the Somersham 4U Newsletter? There is a link between my house 20/22 High Street, the old thatched house and the new build. Essentially, we are using the same technology in my house dated 1490 and the new house 2025 and that is 535 years of proven technology.

In 1490 the builders knew their materials which had been in use from the early round houses, basically earth and sticks in a timber frame. When my wife Margaret and I rebuilt our house, we learnt how to work the wonderful material daub [earth and straw] and helped to create Eartha the East Anglia Telluric houses Association. Over the course of 3 decades we worked on many historic and listed buildings and I was a part time tutor for Madingley College, Cambs University to teach earth construction. However, I retired in 2012 but felt that earth construction was not considered a modern building material.

So, what are the benefits of an Earthen structure?

The walls are breathable ie. the walls vent moisture which controls humidity in a room preventing mould. They store heat in the winter and keep heat out in the summer. They do not burn, they are low carbon, totally sustainable with no waste. As the blocks dry, they carbonate which means they take in CO2 from the atmosphere and can do this for up to 150 years, each year becoming stronger. The new house will be monitored by Bath and Vaisala for strength and moisture control.

• Our A and B netball teams both won their area heats and the A team will go to the county final, which takes place at the end of May. Our school football team is in the semi-final of the Dickenson Cup and we are looking forward to this match. It is great that we are enjoying such sporting success and that the children are representing the school so well.

• On an individual level, one of our Year 5 children won the 'Meridian Innovator' competition earlier this term. This is a competition run by Meridian Trust, where the children have to devise an original invention. This year's theme was a device for a car infotainment system, and one of our children won this with an ingenious idea called the 'Alco-Beeper' which detected alcohol on the breath of a driver before they began to drive.

SOMERSHAM LIBRARY SUMMER READING CHALLENGE

This event, coordinated by the Cambridgeshire Library Service, is held each year during the schools' summer holidays. The Challenge is to read six books (or more) during the summer break as a way of encouraging primary school children to continue with their reading journey.

Each year there is a different theme, and the children are provided with a relevant booklet to track their progress in the challenge. Children can take a book of their choice out from the library and once they have read it, they return it, and a volunteer will ask them some simple questions about the book which will allow them to share some of their story knowledge. Following this they will be able to collect their sticker to add to their booklet.

A presentation is usually held a week or so following the return to school for those children who have completed the challenge. We endeavour to make it a special occasion by inviting published authors to hand out the medals and certificates to the children and to chat with them about reading and writing books.

REMEMBRANCE DAY ROAD CLOSURE

This year for the first time, The Royal British Legion require a full road closure (similar to that on 1st December Christmas Lights closure) for their Remembrance Day Parade.

This means that a minimum of three fully trained and qualified Road Operatives and one Supervisor will be required to assist with a road closure at the Cross from 10.30am to 11.30 am on Sunday 9th November.

The qualification required is for supervisors and operatives who are required to carry out roles and responsibilities in accordance with standards prescribed by awarding bodies and as required by the New Roads and Street Works Act, such as:

NRSWA - New Roads & Street Works - Signing, Lighting and Guarding - For Operatives

NRSWA - New Roads & Street Works - Signing, Lighting and Guarding - For Supervisors

Somersham Nature Reserve

Summer will soon be upon the Nature Reserve and the leaves will have changed from their fresh greens of spring into the darker greens of summer. Hopefully the common terns have returned and made use of the tern rafts on the lake, including the one freshly refurbished earlier in the spring by Adam and Tim. On sunny days the meadow will be full of butterflies including common blue and Essex Skippers. If you are really lucky you may see common lizards sun-bathing along the old railway line, an activity known as "basking".
