When I was elected Chairman for the second time the Parish Council was at a very low point. We had just held elections for members and only eight people had bothered to stand leaving us with seven empty places. Some of

the powers that we had were removed immediately and our Gold Standard will be lost next year. The only way to regain these powers is to have a new election for the Parish Council which will have a cost implication. We will have to consider if the cost is worth it as the bill would fall on all of us.

We failed to be quorate, in September, for the first time in our history but fortunately we are now up to full strength.

It was with sadness that we said "goodbye" to Lucy Bird, but we were glad to say "hello" to Katie Ixer, so The Time Bank continues to go from strength to strength.

During the past year we have had many great events including the carnival, The Handlebards, the flower festival, the Christmas Tree Festival and the Christmas Lights switch on.

On Maundy Thursday we listened to Chris Hill on the background of the Passover Celebrations and what it means to us today.

Strength and balance classes can keep you doing the things you enjoy June—July 2019

A local woman has put a spring in her step after joining strength and balance classes that are keeping her doing the things she enjoys. Rita (pictured below) aged 77 from Ely joined the fun and sociable class at the local library having heard about it from a friend after a recent fall. The class featured as part of the successful Stronger for Longer campaign. Rita said: "The class has helped me with my walking, strength, balance, and posture, along with confidence outside of the class." "I can see the difference in myself, I do a lot of walking and since going to classes I am now able to walk that bit longer without any problems – which means I can go out more and enjoy with my friends. "Coming to the class will improve your well-being and help you to keep active. You will meet new people and it can be fun." Since the launch of the Stronger for Longer campaign back in October, over 100 new people have joined strength and balance classes around the county and are now stronger and steadier. Over 2,300 people have also downloaded our Supersix leaflet, which is helping people to do strength and balance exercises at home at least twice a week.

Huntingdonshire district council's One Leisure Active Lifestyle team run many falls prevention classes throughout the district. Blood Bikers

Did you know that whilst you are tucked up in bed at night all over the country dedicated volunteers are transporting much needed blood, plasma, platelets, samples, vaccines, and any other urgently required medical items to NHS hospitals and the Air Ambulance service. They are members of a Registered Charity - **SERV** (Service by Emergency Response Volunteers) affectionately known as Blood Bikers, because of their preferred mode of transport, Motor Bikes. They provide this vital service to the NHS entirely free of charge which enables the NHS to divert funds to where they are needed most.



John Gibson who is a local controller in East Anglia came along to our March meeting to describe how the service works. Our local area comprises Suffolk and Cambridge with its major hospitals of Peterborough, Hinchingbrooke, Addenbrookes, Papworth and West Suffolk in Bury St Edmunds. There are 8 drivers who are available from 7pm to 6am every day of the year, working shifts. They provide their own vehicles, pay for their own petrol and repairs and rely entirely on donations and members goodwill.

A talk that really opened our eyes to some very selfless people and the deserving charity behind them.

It shouldn't happen to a Home Economist

At our April meeting Sian Fox gave us a very entertaining talk about her career as a Home Economist, which began as a freelance 6-week job with Sainsbury's. The main challenge for her was the opportunity to work with Jamie Oliver on his School Dinner Programme, arising from his challenge to the board of Sainsburys - as well as many other institutions - to reform school dinners and encourage healthier eating. She said it had been a real privilege for her to be part of his team.

Sian also had an active role in the MEND childhood obesity programme, which encouraged confidence in any sport and for families to adopt a different lifestyle - weight loss and control etc. She is currently with Bosch Siemens Neff as a Home Economist where her first task was to bake brownies with no flour – the alternative was ground up crickets!! Well they are of course full of protein and very good for you!!! She finished her talk with a challenge for us; a 20 question "Food for Thought" Quiz which was very illuminating.

The Church Clock

June—July 2019

If you live near St John's Church in Somersham you will be familiar with the sound of the church clock as it strikes the hours and quarter hours, day and night. You may also be aware that it does not always keep good time. It needs quite frequent adjustment and this is hardly surprising given its age and that, to the best of our knowledge, although it has had some periodic servicing, it has not had a major overhaul since 1974.

The Parochial Church Council are hoping to get the clock mechanism completely overhauled and the dial on the tower cleaned, repainted and the hands and numbers re-gilded. It will be a very expensive project and will be dependant on securing grants to carry out the work.

The clock has an interesting history. It was installed in 1864 by Willson & Woodruff who were watch and clock makers in Somersham, although it is believed that the clock would have been made in London. The history of Willson & Woodruff can be traced through the entries in trade directories, census records and the inscriptions on their two adjacent headstones in the churchyard not far from the tower.

Thomas Willson is first listed in a trade directory in 1839, when he was 29 years old. By 1864 he had a partner in Thomas Woodruff who at some time became his son-in-law, marrying Thomas Willson's daughter, Jane. Thomas Woodruff took over the firm some time between 1885 and 1890 and Thomas Willson died in 1891, aged 81. Thomas Woodruff died in 1914, aged 71.

It is fairly certain that their Watchmakers shop is now the China Garden Restaurant in Somersham, as census records show it between Braunston House at the Cross and a baker's shop (more recently a butcher's shop). There was also a Woodruff's Yard next to the shop which today is the alley between the China Garden Restaurant and the old butcher's shop. There were 2 dwellings in this yard but in the 1911 Census one was called Garden Cottage, High Street, the other was uninhabited.

The clock's Westminster Chimes were added in 1895. They were a gift from a Mr Nicholls as a memorial to Mrs Nicholls and were dedicated in December of that year.

The following entries from the Church Parish Magazines all relate to the clock.

In May 1938 it was recorded that James Darrington had wound the church clock for a quarter of a century.

In March 1974 "The PCC is most grateful to the Somersham Feoffees and the Parish Council who have made contributions to cover the cost of the complete mechanical overhaul of the Church Clock". Permission to carry out the work was announced in the August Magazine and in the November magazine the work was said to have been completed.

In April 1978 – An appeal for £7,000 to carry out essential repairs to the church was launched. It included the re-gilding of the clock dial.

In 1988 the PCC decided to electrify the clock winding mechanism at a cost of £1625 which was paid for by the Somersham Feoffees.

Hopefully we will manage to get the clock overhauled and keeping good time later this year.

Editor's Snippets

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What the chefs need to know...

- Never use a barbecue indoors or on a balcony
- Make sure barbecues are placed on level ground where they will not tip over
- Keep barbecues away from your home, sheds, fences, garden furniture, trees, shrubs and tents
- Don't drink too much alcohol if you are in charge of the cooking
- Don't set up the barbecue in a place where people have to squeeze past it
- Keep children, pets, and garden games well away from the cooking area
- Never leave the barbecue unattended
- Follow the safety instructions provided with disposable barbecues
- Only use approved barbecue fuel or fire lighters never use petrol or paraffin

After you've finished cooking...

- When you have finished cooking, make sure the barbecue is cool before you try to move it
- Empty the cold ash onto bare garden soil never put it in the dustbin
- Where possible, keep a bucket of water, sand, or a garden hose nearby for emergencies

Tips for gas barbecues

- Take extra care when turning bottled gas barbecues on and off
- Make sure the controls and the gas cylinder valve are turned off before you change the cylinder
- Make sure all joints are tightened, safe, and secure
- Change the gas cylinder in the open air
- When you have finished cooking ,Turn off the gas cylinder before the barbecue controls; this makes sure any leftover gas in the pipe is used up
- Store your gas cylinders outside and protected from frost and sunlight
- Never store gas cylinders under the stairs if there is a fire they might explode and block your escape route
- If you think there might be a leak in the gas cylinder connections or pipe, brush soapy water over all of the joints and watch out for bubbles
- If you have a leaky joint, try to tighten it (but don't over tighten it) and test for bubbles again. If unsure do not use the barbecue – seek specialist advice

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

And what's the play about? Well – a group of soldiers return from the war to a household in Messina, causing the kindling of new love interests and the re-kindling of old rivalries. The parallel love stories of Beatrice, Benedick, Claudio and Hero become entangled with plotting, frivolity and melodrama in Shakespeare's famous comedy.

This is an outdoor production, so please bring your own chair or blanket to sit on, a picnic to dig into, and dress for the weather!
