## Chairman's Annual Report

October—November 2018

I am finding this a very difficult report to write as fears that I expressed last time have actually happened faster than I anticipated. At our September meeting we were not quorate, so nothing could be discussed or decided. This meant

that a planning application could not be commented upon and no financial decisions could be made. The worst consequence was that we had five people who had offered themselves for co-option and we were unable to proceed. This is the first time in the history of the Parish Council that it has been inquorate. Hopefully by the time you read this we will have managed to resolve the issue with an emergency meeting.

With the good weather we have had several successful events including the HandleBards and Picnic in the Park. We hope to have them both again next year. The comment I heard about The HandleBards was "I didn't know Shakespeare could be so much fun".

The High Street, between Tesco's and Feoffees Road, is due to be resurfaced during the first part of November and the road will be closed at night so that the work can be done. The Chatteris Road is going to be rebuilt which means that it will be closed during November for almost a month as well.

I shall not be able to lay a wreath this year at The War Memorial on 11<sup>th</sup> November as I will be at The Cenotaph in London taking part in The Peoples' Thankyou Parade where a special memorial wreath will be laid from Somersham. Also, The Christmas Lights team will be busy putting up the Christmas lights and hopefully Father Christmas can be persuaded to visit us again for the switch on.

Finally, even with the new proposed councillors we are still short of Councillors as Debbie Dew has resigned.

I would like to thank Debbie for all the work that she has done while she was a councillor.

# Household news

The Cambridgeshire Energy Switch is a scheme that builds on the strengths of Cambridgeshire County Council, the District Councils and residents, and brings them together in order to get a cheaper energy tariff. Taking part in the Cambridgeshire Energy Switch is free and without obligation. The more people that participate in the scheme; the more likely we are able to achieve cheaper energy prices.

The Cambridgeshire Energy Switch holds its next energy auction on the 9<sup>th</sup> of October. The supplier who offers the cheapest tariff in the auction will offer registered households a new energy contract. From the 22<sup>nd</sup> of October personal offers will be sent out and households will be able to see straight away how much money they could save on their annual energy bill. They then decide if they want to accept the offer or not.

We are working with **iChoosr** to provide the energy auctions. **iChoosr** is an independent and completely impartial service provider. They aim to provide a better energy deal and also ensure that the switching experience is simple and convenient. **iChoosr** do not supply energy, but across the country **iChoosr** have successfully switched over 40,000 families who have collectively saved nearly £6 million; making a difference to their household budgets. In February 2018, over 400 Cambridgeshire families switched energy suppliers through this scheme and between them made savings of over £70,000, saving each household an average of £167 a year. There are a number of advantages with the Cambridgeshire Energy Switch:

You can count on the assistance and support of our Customer Care team before, during and after your switch.*

Throughout the year and particularly as the winter months draw in, we begin using our fires, burners and chimneys once again to warm our homes. Follow our 'top tips' below to ensure your home is kept safe and warm all year round.

### Chimneys and Fires

- Have your chimney swept once a year or more frequently if you burn wood
- Only burn fuels suitable for your burner
- Do not overload the grate/ appliance
- Do not bank fires too high and remember to let them burn out well before you go to bed
- Use a fire/spark guard to prevent accidental fires and make sure it has the kite mark or conforms to British/ European standards
- Inspect your chimney breast, particularly the roof space. Make sure it is sound and sparks/fumes cannot escape through cracks or broken bricks.

### Wood/Multi-Fuel Burners

- A qualified and competent engineer should install all wood/multi-fuel burners and boilers – regular maintenance should be undertaken to prolong the working life of the appliance. Specialist servicing and maintenance will usually be provided by the company you purchase the appliance from but you can also refer to [www.solidfuel.co.uk](http://www.solidfuel.co.uk) for advice and information
- Ensure correct ventilation is in place when the appliance is in use
  - Wood burning appliances should only use the right quality wood recommended by the supplier
  - Avoid wet or newly felled wood as this will cause tars/ creosote deposits forming in the burning appliance and chimney
  - Using laminated chip boards will leave binding glue deposits
  - At the end of each burning season and at least once during the season the entire system should be cooled and thoroughly cleaned to maintain top performance.

### Most importantly

- Fit a smoke alarm that carries the kite mark or British Standard Number 5446 and test your alarm weekly by pressing the test button and know the life of your battery.
- Always also install a CO alarm in the room where the burner is installed. Chimney Fires continue to be a common occurrence in home fires in the winter months. We experience an average of 81 chimney fires a year in Cambridgeshire alone. Whatever fire you have, or fuel you burn, it is vitally important you have your chimney swept to avoid a build-up of ash and soot.

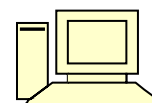
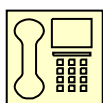

## *The Royal British Legion Somersham Branch*

October—November 2018



I recently enjoyed a meeting with a member from Somersham Parish Council in the hope that we can work together on a joint project for this year's Remembrance Day and was surprised to learn that a lot of people do not understand what the Royal British Legion (RBL) do. There is a lot more about the RBL other than turning out on the streets at the end of October each year to sell poppies.



So what do they do?.. Well since The Legion's conception way back in May 1921 the main aim was to support the survivors (and their families) who had fought in World War One but were unable to look after themselves once the war had ended, The poppy appeal started with the aim of selling poppies in the few weeks before the Remembrance Day Parade and using the profits to help the returning service personnel.

Some of the milestones achieved by the Legion are as follows:

- The introduction of the Women Section known as The Woman's Auxiliary Section which allowed ex-Servicewoman to be admitted to the Legion the word Auxiliary was dropped in 1922.
- The first Legion Poppy Day was held on November 11<sup>th</sup>, 1921.
- In 1926 it gained its Royal Charter which gave the Legion its formal status and empowered it with the authority that covered every aspect of the Legion's work with the ex-service community.

Further changes to its charter happened throughout the Legion history from the Queen becoming its patron (allowing the Legion to use the word Royal in its title in May 1971) to membership being extended to serving members of Her Majesty's Forces in 1981.

Today the Legion has opened its doors to allow people who have never served in Her Majesty's Forces to join so anyone can now become a Member.

The monies that the Legion collect go to support ex-service personnel and families in a number of ways the range includes Care Homes with Dementia Support, Admiral Nurses who supply advice and support to our beneficiaries who have Dementia, Mobility Equipment including Stair Lifts, Handy Vans which are fully equipped vans and a service engineer who will support with small DIY projects around the homes of our beneficiaries. RBL can also provide a range of service to support our personnel through any form of Mental Illness.

In Somersham we have a branch HQ which is the hall attached to the Centurion which we use for meetings and hire out for private functions. The legion members also run a small bar inside the hall which is open at Sunday lunch time and open to anybody members or not. So if you might be keen to become a member pop along we will only be too happy to see you. # The Great Pilgrimage 90-years on August 5<sup>th</sup> to 9<sup>th</sup> 2018.

Both Janet and myself set off along with others from Cambridgeshire, from Trumpington for this recreation of the pilgrimage of 1918. Others set off from other places in the U.K. There were over 2000 people.

We stayed near Lille so travelled each day to the battlefields and on the 6<sup>th</sup> into Ypres for the parade. It was very hot in France and Belgium, but we had the luxury of air conditioned coaches, back in 1918 they travelled by train and charabanc which could not have been comfortable.

On the 6<sup>th</sup> we travelled south, visiting the Somme, Thiepval Memorial, Thiepval Wood, Ulster Tower, Longueval and the South African Memorial at Delville Wood. Then we travelled to Arras to a huge cemetery and saw the Memorial to the Royal Flying Corp. Ending the day at Vimy Ridge which is where you find the large Canadian Memorial over looking the plain where the battle took place. Back to Lille. On the 7<sup>th</sup> we travelled north going first to Tyne Cot, the largest cemetery on the Western Front. This is built on the remnants of German Blockhouses and covers a huge area with graves and a large wall of remembrance. From here we visited Crest Farm, the highest point in the area, then on to Passchendaele a very interesting museum. We travelled on to Hill 60 and visited mine craters near a railway cutting. Then on to Ypres where we visited the museum in the Cloth Hall. This is a fantastic museum, well laid out and very informative. We also managed a quick visit to a café in the square soaking up the atmosphere of such a beautiful rebuilt city. Back to Lille

August 8<sup>th</sup>, parade day, another early start 8 am, and into Ypres. Everything was well organised, on entering the city we had a police escort and only allowed to travel on certain roads as others were closed. We parked in a designated area, and went to a marquee to await the next part. Refreshments were available and also seating as it was along wait. Janet and I separated as Standard Bearers went to one part and wreath layers another. At about 11.30 am the Standard Bearers lined up and walked off to the place along a road not far away. Once they had all gone, the wreath layers did the same, and we lined up along side them in the same street. At 12 noon we heard the clock strike and then the band started to play and the march started. It took a long time to march to the Menin Gate as there were over 2000 Standard Bearers and wreath layers. After a short service, and the exhortation read, the last post was played by the firemen of Ypres and then the wreaths were laid. First by the dignitaries present and then everyone else.

This took several minutes, we all went up through the Menin Gate and down the ramparts ready to march back. After all the wreaths were laid the National anthem was played and sung by everyone there. All the Standards marched off which took about 5 minutes followed by the wreath layers.

Once back at our start place we were given free time in Ypres, before travelling back to Lille via Langemark a German cemetery, which is very different. This gave us chance to see what was happening in the square, where there was entertainment and to revisit the Menin Gate to see all the wreaths.

A MAGNIFICENT SIGHT.

August 9<sup>th</sup> Travelled back home via Calais and Dover.

It was a marvellous experience and something Janet and I will never forget. It was privilege to attend and represent the village and the Women's section of the RBL

*Come along on Saturday 3rd November to the War Memorial (High Street) between 10-1pm to attach your poppies to the display.*

*The Poppy Appeal Annual Cake Sale will be running at the same time at the Cross*



*Poppies can be made out of any material, but do need to be able to survive the outside weather for a few weeks.*
