Since the last edition of Somersham4U we have had two councillors resign from the Parish Council, Claire Fidler and Kirsty Meadows.

We offer thanks for their service and offer good luck wishes for the future. Three new councillors have since been co-opted onto the Council - Andrew Chapman, Amanda Cass and Tori Piper, and we welcome them.

There are plans for three new commemorative benches (to replace existing life expired ones) sited around the village. If anyone would like to have a commemorative plaque fixed to one of the benches, please contact the parish office. We are offering this opportunity in exchange for any gratefully received donations towards the cost of the bench.

"Hattie's map" in Church Street has had its wording replaced after earlier vandalism. Apple Day and the Fungi Forage events both went well, and were enjoyed by all concerned. The multi-sports area at the Norwood Playing Field is due to be resurfaced and have the flood lights replaced, although re-lining can not take place until the spring. There are eight different

HOUSEHOLD SUPPORT FUND

The Government has provided a Household Support Fund to local authorities for the period 1 April 2023 to 31 March 2024. This is money the council has been awarded by HM Government to help those in need and most affected by the cost of living crisis to support them to resolve their financial issues. The Household Support Fund (HSF) helps people experiencing immediate financial hardship to pay for food and household energy bills

It is not charity and does not need to be paid back.

From 25 October 2023, the funding in Cambridgeshire will be offered to households as follows:

- You are entitled to apply for a financial award of £110.
- The financial award will be paid in one single payment, in your choice of cash or food/energy vouchers.
- You can make two claims for the financial award, per year. (You must allow 3 months between each application)
- The total amount payable to you, per year, will be £220.

Somersham Primary School

The autumn term was a busy one at Somersham Primary School! The children continue to learn, play and thrive as part of our wonderful school community.

By the time this article is published, the busy Christmas season will have passed. Our Key Stage One children will have performed their production of 'The Angel Who Nearly Missed It All' to parents and carers, and children will have enjoyed a tasty Christmas dinner and a day wearing their Christmas jumpers. The PFA will have organised another super Christmas Fayre and funded a pantomime to come and entertain the children. All this will have taken place while the children continued to focus on their learning and making progress in the basic skills.

The autumn term saw lots of exciting enrichment opportunities for children across the school. Year 6 went on a residential trip to Hilltop Outdoor Centre in North Norfolk, while our Year 3/4 children enjoyed a day at Flag Fen, a Bronze Age site in Peterborough. Our younger children explored more about the local community with walks round the village linked to their learning. The school has continued to send representatives to area sports events, and children have attended a wide range of clubs.

Somersham is such a wonderful community, and it is great for the children to be able to be part of this. The school's choir has performed for a Time Bank Coffee Morning and was part of 'A Winter's Tale Music Extravaganza' before Christmas. We were also pleased to contribute a tree to the Christmas Tree Festival and support the Royal British Legion through selling poppies. Currently, each week a different class is walking to the library.

There is never a dull day at Somersham! This was borne out in the findings of an Ofsted inspection, which took place at the beginning of the autumn term. The inspection team spent two days rigorously exploring every aspect of school life, and rated the school as 'Outstanding' in all areas. The whole school community was thrilled with the outcome, particularly because the school had been previously rated 'Inadequate' in a 2018 inspection. The improvement is testament to the hard work of all the adults and children, and we will continue to be striving for the highest possible outcomes for all our young people.

THE WHITE POST

Most local people will be aware of the 'White Post' that is situated at the junction of the roads to St Ives and Pidley. If you have looked it at closely you will have seen that it bears the date 1773, which is the date of the year of the Turnpike Act. If that is the date when it was erected, then it is 250 years old this year (2023).



According to a statement made in the House of Commons in 1765 the road across the heath from Somersham to St Ives was "in a very ruiness condition, narrow in places, and dangerous to passengers". A turnpike trust was set up by Parliament to remedy the situation. This meant that a group of men were authorised to collect tolls from people travelling along this road to get it repaired and maintained. Eight years after the turnpike had been set up, a General Turnpike Act was passed in 1773. Among other things, this Act ordered trusts to set up and maintain guideposts.

The 'White Post' was originally sited on the 'Cross', where Church Street meets the High Street. In 1824 there was a fire in the centre of Somersham which spread to several buildings in the centre of the village *(more about this in a future edition of*

Somersham4U). When the burnt-down premises were rebuilt the street was made narrower and the post moved to its present position. The 'Cross' before that time may have formed the village green and have been the place where the weekly market was held.

Near the top of the White Post is a small hole that goes right through it and it is said that in the old days (probably when it was in the middle of the village) it was possible on looking through the hole to see Ely Cathedral. However, this would seem rather doubtful as the

village of Sutton lies directly between Somersham and Ely 'as the crow flies' and as Sutton is over twenty metres above sea level it probably obscures the view of Ely Cathedral and Sutton Church also has an octagonal tower.

The White Post did have some metal railings around it, but in April 2004 a grant was secured to remove them, pave the area around the post, site some bollards on the perimeter and install lighting for night-time illumination.

On This Day

10 Jan 1840 Sir Rowland Hill introduced the Penny Post to Britain. Mail was delivered at a standard charge rather than being paid by the recipient. On its first day, 112,000 letters were posted in London alone.

14 Feb 1852 London's famous children's hospital in Great Ormond Street accepted its first patient, three year-old Eliza Armstrong. It was the first hospital in the English speaking world providing in-patient beds specifically for children.

22 Jan 1902 Marconi carried out his first radio transmission experiments, transmitting from the Lizard, Cornwall, across the water to St. Catherine's on the Isle of Wight.

16 Jan 1908 The first issue of the magazine Scouting for Boys: A Handbook for Instruction in Good Citizenship; the first book on the Scout Movement. It was written and illustrated by Robert Baden-Powell, its founder. It is reputedly the fourth best selling book of the 20th century, estimated at 100 to 150 million copies, in 87 languages.

4 Feb 1927 Malcolm Campbell reached 174.88 mph in Bluebird on the Pendine Sands in Wales to set a new land speed record. A year later in 1928 at Daytona Beach, Florida, he reached 206.35 mph. Four years and one day later, in 1931, he reached a record-breaking 245 mph, again at Daytona Beach.
